EMERGENCY NUMBERS

Call 911 in case of emergency. In case of fire or gas leak, evacuate and *then* call 911 from a safe distance. Fire extinguishers are located on each level.

The Holland Hospital emergency room is located at 602 Michigan Ave, Holland and it is open 24 hours a day. Poison control can be reached at 1-800-222-1222.

QUIET HOURS

Respect quiet hours from 10pm until 8am. Noise heard outside the home may not exceed the volume of a normal conversation. Keep in mind that sound carries here *significantly* more than you may be used to. Be especially considerate if you are outside or have open windows.

PARKING & OCCUPANCY LIMITS

Street parking and lawn parking is not allowed. A maximum of vehicles are allowed to park at the property. Please only park in the designated area(s).

FIREWORKS, SMOKING, & RECREATIONAL FIRES

Fireworks of any kind are prohibited at the vacation rental, on the street, and in nearby areas. Public displays are available to view during Independence Day and Tulip Time.

For vacation rentals located in wooded areas, outdoor smoking is prohibited. Please see the house rules for any other requirements related to smoking.

Please see the house rules for information regarding recreational fires, if allowed.

YEAR ROUND WATER SAFETY

Practice water safety/awareness at all times. Red flags mean stay on the beach and out of the water due to dangerous water conditions. **Never go in the water while there are red flags**, even if you see other people doing so.

There can be rip currents in Lake Michigan. These powerful currents of water can sweep even the strongest swimmer away from shore. If you get caught in a rip current, swim along the shoreline until you can escape it. If you can't escape, float or tread water while yelling or waving for help instead of struggling and wearing yourself out.

Stay off ice shelves along the shoreline in winter as they are unstable and extremely dangerous. People walking on them does **not** mean they are safe; it means people are unaware of the danger. You can suddenly fall through and then be unable to escape the frigid water because of the surrounding ice. You will quickly freeze.
